Hello Academy Members! The ANPT Practice Committee is dedicating Part 1 of our Message to payment and practice updates including best practices in telehealth, information blocking, diversity, equity, and inclusion and resources on neurogenic bladder. #### **Telehealth Updates**

Telehealth rules, regulations, and reimbursement rates are continuously evolving. Ensure your neuro practice is staying up to date with the latest information by checking your state's rules and regulations and the reimbursement rates and guidelines for the payers most commonly used at your practice. Licensure and reimbursement are two of the most common areas clinician need to be aware of. Some key questions to consider are:

- Have there been changes to your <u>state practice act</u> regarding telehealth or have any of the temporary telehealth state waivers or executive orders expired?
- Has your state established payment parity with in-person services?
- Does your state have specific rules regarding telehealth for Medicaid recipients or other coding requirements for 3rd party payers?
  - 1. Is telehealth covered for both new and existing clients?
  - 2. What CPT codes are allowed to be billed as telehealth?
  - 3. Are there any location restrictions (which type of sites can bill telehealth) and required modifiers?

You may also have clients who would benefit from telehealth but are limited by equipment or necessary resources. The <u>Emergency Broadband Benefit</u> is available through the <u>Federal Communication Commission (FCC) program</u> to help families and households struggling to afford internet service during the pandemic.

For therapists who are just getting started, the APTA now has a <u>Telehealth Certificate</u> Series available through the APTA Learning Center. The ANPT has also recently appointed a Neurologic Telehealth Task Force and soon there will be added resource to the ANPT page. Stay tuned!

### Information Blocking: The What and Why

New federal regulations on information blocking went into effect on April 5th. Do you know what has changed or how it will impact your practice?

- What is Information Blocking? Information blocking is a practice by certain entities that is likely to interfere with, prevent, or discourage the access, exchange, or use of electronic health information.
- <u>Does this law affect PTs and PTAs?</u> Yes, as physical therapists and physical therapist assistants, you are subject to the rule, with financial disincentives or penalties for noncompliance.
- How does this law affect me? The rule allows you to think more strategically about how you share health information. Additionally, therapists in all settings should be aware that patients are more likely to read their documentation.
- Where can I learn more? The APTA has compiled several resources to help you understand and comply with this new rule. This <u>article in APTA magazine</u> and the <u>CMS Fact Sheet</u> can help you understand what constitutes information blocking and how to comply with the new regulations.
