Public Health Emergency Extended...Again

On April 12, 2022, Secretary of Health and Human Services Xavier Becerra renewed the Public Health Emergency (PHE) due to COVID-19. The new expiration date of the PHE is the end of the day on July 14, 2022. This extension allows PTs to continue providing services via telehealth under Medicare for an additional five months past the end of the PHE allowing the profession more time to advocate for a more permanent change.

Clinical Practice Guidelines (CPG) vs. Clinical Prediction Rules (CPR)

As neurologic physical therapists work to uphold the highest standards of evidence-based practice, Clinical Practice Guidelines and Clinical Prediction Rules are some of the available tools to guide best practice. Clinical Practice Guidelines are graded recommendations on best practice for a specific condition based on the systematic review and evaluation of the quality of the scientific literature. Clinical prediction rules assist in making a physical therapy diagnosis, establishing a prognosis, or implementing an intervention.

Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Proposed Rule Updates

Proposed Rule:

CMS released the fiscal year (FY) 2023 proposed rule for Inpatient Rehabilitation Facilities (IRF) ((click here)) on March 31st and for Skilled Nursing Facilities for Part A services reimbursed under Patient Driven Payment Model (SNF PPS) (click here) on April 11th.

IRF proposed rules have minimal changes accompanied by a 2% increase.
 Additionally, CMS has a request for public comments by May 31st on quality reporting measures concept, promoting health equity, quality data reporting

- and transfer policy rules to home health discharges.
- **SNF PPS** builds upon the Biden-Harris Administration's commitment to advance health equity, drive high-quality person-centered care, and promote sustainability of its programs, which will result in a .7% drop in payment to skilled nursing facilities. Other important points noted in the proposed rule include:
 - Application of a permanent 5 percent cap on any decreases to a provider's wage index from its wage index in the prior year, regardless of the circumstances causing the decline.
 - Changes to the ICD-10 mappings and lists
 - Adoption of three new measures into the Value Based Purchasing Program including for FFY 2026 total nursing staffing and health careassociated infections and FFY 2027 discharge to community.
- CMS is also seeking public feedback (by June 10) on how staffing in nursing homes and health equity improvements could lead to better health outcomes.

Other updates:

The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021 established several new requirements to protect consumers from surprise medical bills. On April 6, 2022, CMS published a Frequently Asked Questions document for providers regarding the No Surprise Rules. Answered questions include: requirements and prohibitions, application for insurances, where to send questions, what providers it applies to and others. CMS continues to review the need for existing emergency blanket waivers for special providers issued in response to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Public Health Emergency (PHE).
