# **APTA 2021 House of Delegates**

In September, APTA celebrated 100 years of history in Washington D.C. Key actions adopted by the 77th House of Delegates over the past two years include:

- Addressing Systemic Racism and DEI: APTA is "committed to being an anti-racist organization" that believes the association and members, collectively and individually, "have an obligation to address policies and practices that perpetuate systemic racism and inequity in our association, the profession, and society" was adopted overwhelmingly by delegates. Additionally, "inclusion" has now been added to the core values for physical therapists and physical therapist assistants.
- Promoting the role of physical therapist services in recovery from COVID-19 and post-acute sequelae of SARS CoV-2
- Urging the APTA to take a closer look at specialization within the profession, including creating "a long-term strategy to enhance the evolution and integration of specialization, and potentially sub-specialization, into the advanced practice of physical therapy"

# Stabilizing Medicare Access to Rehabilitation in Outpatient Settings

On October 8th, a bill was introduced in congress entitled the Stabilizing Medicare Access to Rehabilitation and Therapy (SMART) Act of 2021 (H.R.5536). This bill will provide for a temporary delay to a reimbursement reduction in the CY 2022 Medicare Physician Fee Schedule. The bill may impact neurologic PTs and PTAs by:



- Delaying the implementation date of the Medicare 15% physical therapy assistant and occupational therapy assistant differential to January 1, 2023
- Providing exemptions to the PTA differential in rural and underserved areas
- Allowing for general supervision of PTAs in outpatient settings under Medicare Part B which would align with supervision requirements in all other practice settings

Congress needs to take action on this bill before this policy is implemented on January 1, 2022 to avoid the cuts. Utilize the **APTA Action Center** to send an email to your representative. Look for the initiative labeled "Support Physical Therapist Assistants".

If the legislation is not passed, the new fee schedule and CQ payment modifier will be in effect January 1, 2022.

# Durable Medical Equipment, Prosthetics and Supplies (DMEPOS) Policy Update

The Center for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) has created an exclusion policy for complex wheelchair equipment from the DMEPOS Competitive Bidding Program (CBP). This includes accessories and seating systems associated with group 3 or higher complex rehabilitation power wheelchair and complex manual wheelchairs.

# Updates to Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program (PSLF)

On October 6, 2021 the Department of Education announced a time-limited waiver to the Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program. This program applies to employees working for a government or non-profit organizations which includes many neurologic physical therapists. The waiver applies to Direct

Loans, Federal Family Education Loans, and Perkins Loans and has the potential to significantly decrease the amount of time left before loan forgiveness is achieved.

#### Immediate changes that borrowers should be aware of:

- Limited-time PSLF waiver to count all prior payments made, regardless of loan type or repayment plan. Applicants must submit necessary paperwork by October 31, 2022
- Automatically adjust PSLF qualifying payment counts for borrowers that otherwise would not have qualified due technical requirements around choice of payment plan, timing, and amount of payment
- Eliminate barriers for military service members to access PSLF.
- Automatically help service members and federal employees access PSLF
- Review denied PSLF applications and identify and correct errors in processing

#### Upcoming changes to PSLF program:

- Improve outreach and communication with PSLF-eligible borrowers
- Simplify PSLF application process
- Make long-term improvements to PSLF through rulemaking
